Why do hyperbaric technicians check every new patient chart when there are EMR reports that pull hyperbaric candidates? This is an easy question to answer. The reason is because we're a team! Yes, the EMR plays its role, but we have more training than technology. We know that just because a patient does not have a qualifying diabetic foot ulcer does not mean they may not have another indication for hyperbaric oxygen therapy. Things the EMR might not catch but your hyperbaric tech will catch.

- · Radiation wounds
- · Chronic refractory osteomyelitis diagnosis in any a sacral pressure ulcer
- · Failed flap labeled as a surgical wound
- · Surgical wound or pressure ulcers that are on diabetic feet
- · Wagner grade 3 or higher ulcers that have been receiving standard of care outside of our clinic, making them eligible for HBOT immediately and not waiting an additional 30 days
- · Gangrene as a potential Wagner grade 4
- · Wagner 2 that has never closed and has been present for many years and does have a history of osteomyelitis
- New surgical wound that is the result of an amputated Wagner 3 that tests positive for osteomyelitis
- · "Acute osteomyelitis" that has been recurring in the same bone despite conservative treatment for many years

The hyperbaric techs are trained to scan these charts with eagle eyes and comprehension. They will ask the questions. Encourage the relationship between hyperbaric techs and wound care physicians and nursing. Pick one another's brain, learn from each other. We're all part of the wound healing team!

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## NATIONAL "I LOVE MY FEET DAY" A GOOD REMINDER FOR DIABETICS


